

OUTING TO "OLD MAN LAGOON" 17TH FEBRUARY 2018

Due to the stifling heat our small group met at "Old Man Lagoon" at the late hour of 4 p.m. It was actually quite pleasant in the shade of the trees with the occasional "sea breeze" off the lagoon.

We let the birds do the work and watched them as they appeared. The highlights were: two species of Spoonbill, the Royal and the Yellow-billed (LEFT- Leigh Plant's photo), and three species of Fairy-wren, the Superb, Red-backed and Variegated. We basically sat, watched and talked until the light began to fade and the mosquitoes woke up. The water level in the lagoon was quite low but, since the

rain, is now at about half or a little better.

PALAEONTOLOGY SESSION AT ROTARY MEETING – 13TH FEBRUARY 2018

The club was invited to attend a Rotary meeting in Chinchilla. The special guests at the meeting were Dr. Andrew Rozefelds of Queensland Museum, Dr. Gilbert Price of The University of Queensland and Julien Louys of Griffith University. Dr. Gilbert Price participated in several digs at the Chinchilla Rifle Range where Cec and Doris Wilkinson worked for several decades. The guests were organised by Rotarian Lloyd Beasley who has a collection of fossils from the Chinchilla area. The main messages from the speakers were:

- Fossils can provide clues about the climate at that time,
- Many fossils have modern descendants which are quite similar to them in various ways while others have been described and named but cannot be placed in a Genus or even a Family because there is nothing in the modern world that looks like them, and
- Citizen scientists (amateur scientists) such as Cec and Doris Wilkinson and Ian Sobbe (a Darling Downs farmer) can still play a significant role. By collecting fossils in a systematic manner and then making them available to institutions such as museums and universities, gaps in the sequences of plant and animal fossils can be filled and the reasons how and why they have evolved that way can be proposed. Understanding how and why life changed in certain ways can warn us to potential threats in the future.

It was pointed out that the Megafauna animal fossils found around Chinchilla are from the relatively recent Pliocene Epoch which extends from 6.5 to 2 million years before the present, but the fossil plants that Andrew Rozefelds was talking about (found from the Chinchilla to the Taroom areas) were from the much older Jurassic Period (of "Jurassic Park" age) which began 206 million years ago and ended with the Cretaceous Period 144 million years ago. We have a very rich flora and fauna fossil area which would benefit from careful investigation by more people like Ian Sobbe and Cec and Doris Wilkinson.

DOWN MEMORY LANE – MARCH 1983

The March meeting was held on the 18th. A guest for the evening was ornithologist Roy Wheeler who was passing through the area.

(I did a Google search and found this: Wilson Roy Wheeler (1905-1988) was an Australian postman and professional ornithologist. He was an active bird bander and was convener of the Altona Survey Group, later part of the Victorian Ornithological Research Group. In 1965 he was awarded the Australian Natural History Medallion. He was a member of the Royal Australasian Ornithologists Union (RAOU), President 1964-1965, and made a Fellow of the RAOU in 1971. He was also very active in the Bird Observers Club (BOCA), serving as President (1951-1954), Honorary Secretary (1954-1971) and Honorary Treasurer (1963-1971). In 2005 he was commemorated, on the occasion of BOCA's centenary, by the creation of a new award, the W. Roy Wheeler Medallion for Excellence in Field Ornithology.) We were very fortunate in those days to have contact with such illustrious people.

Speaker for the evening was Cec Cameron whose subject was his recent trip to Kenya. A \$50 donation was passed for the Bird Observers' Club to help with the recent bushfires in Victoria.

The March outing was held on the 19th at "Bellevue". I presume that the outing was held on the day after the meeting because Roy Wheeler was present. It was very dry with the only green feed in melon holes. As you would imagine birds were the main fare for the day although they found and tentatively identified a Trapdoor Spider *Arbanitis gracilis* (now *Misgolas gracilis*). Later that evening they heard a Barn Owl (amongst others). We were only recently discussing the apparent disappearance of Barn Owls in the last decade or two.

Following dinner they went frogging in the "Big Swamp" and they also collected several more spiders. Well done!

Some CFNC members also participated in the regular Easter campout of the Queensland Ornithological Society, held that year at the Kerr's property "Kia-Ora", Kogan.
